#### What is school exclusion?

- A fixed-term exclusion means your child is told to stay away from school for a set number of days.
- A **permanent exclusion** (also called "expulsion") means your child can no longer attend the school.

Schools cannot exclude your child because they can't meet their needs—this is unfair and not allowed.

## When can a school permanently exclude?

Only for serious disciplinary reasons, for example:

- Physical violence or threats
- Carrying a weapon
- Sexual misconduct
- Racially-aggravated behaviour
- Drug offences (like dealing)

They must try other solutions first, unless the situation is very serious

## What to do if your child is excluded

#### Check the paperwork:

- You must receive a **letter** from the school explaining:
  - The type of exclusion (fixed-term or permanent), and
  - The **reason** for it.

#### Respond quickly:

- Fixed-term: Often no appeal needed but meet with school afterward.
- Permanent: You have the right to appeal.

# How to appeal a permanent exclusion

#### Step 1: Appeal to the school governors

- You can challenge the decision within 6–15 days after the exclusion.
- The governors can:

- change it to a fixed-term exclusion,
- cancel it, or
- reduce the length of exclusion.

#### Step 2: Appeal to the local authority appeals panel

If governors refuse your appeal, you can go to a panel set up by your local council.

#### What the school must do

Even during exclusion, the school must provide work for your child to do at home.

If they can't return your child after exclusion, the **local authority** must arrange suitable education .

### Unlawful practices to watch for

- Off-rolling: When a school pushes parents to take their child out so they don't appear in school stats. This is illegal.
- **Discrimination**: If your child has a disability (e.g. autism, ADHD) and is excluded more than other children for similar behaviour—this could be **unlawful discrimination**.

#### **Parent checklist**

- Check the school's exclusion letter (type, reason, dates)
- Get paperwork if it's a permanent exclusion
- Appeal quickly: to governors, then local authority if needed
- Ask the school to provide learning materials at home
- Seek advice (Your local SENDIAS, (IPSEA or other support)
